#### WCAC HAD A YEAR OF **TREMENDOUS GROWTH IN 2023**

that manifested in several ways including our staffing and services, and through the implementation of our philosophy to improve economic mobility via client centered decision-making. We began the year by moving and settling into our newly renovated main office space and concluded the year by unpacking boxes in three new Head Start classrooms in Leicester and East Brookfield. Throughout the year, we served a record number of new heating assistance clients reaching nearly 17,000 households, and placed more than 600 young people into work experiences at nearly 100 employer sites. Our Resiliency Center staff more than doubled and are actively supporting hundreds of clients with financial empowerment coaching and community navigation strategies.

Additionally, we launched a new quaranteed basic income program, and contributed to a significant family nutrition pilot as one of three Healthy Family programs in the Commonwealth in collaboration with Massachusetts General Hospital. Our growth has been the result of great commitment to compassion, innovation, and a focus on improving our clients' experiences throughout the agency.

We continue to pursue creative ways to find solutions to age-old issues and are constantly striving to streamline processes to maximize convenience, promote efficiency and improve client experiences across programs. We continue to embrace partnerships with countless community organizations who share our commitment to eradicating poverty, inequality, and injustice. In the year ahead we'll continue to push for necessary policy changes and critical budgetary allocations to protect and sustain the advancements we have made, always mindful of our mission and values to improve the communities where we live and work.

#### **2023 PROGRAM OUTCOMES**

### Heating & Energy Assistance

- WCAC's Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)
   processed 16,473 applications, delivering over
   \$17 MILLION IN HEATING BENEFITS via 58 vendors
   to 12,790 HOUSEHOLDS.
- → 50% OF THOSE HOUSEHOLDS receiving heating assistance were households with at least one ELDERLY resident; 12% were households with CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF SIX; 40% of households were either selfemployed or otherwise EARNING WAGES; 2% were receiving UNEMPLOYMENT.
- → 1,908 HOUSEHOLDS improved energy efficiency and/ or their energy burden was reduced through WCAC'S ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROGRAMS with 623 HOUSEHOLDS (1,314 people) receiving HEATING SYSTEMS REPAIRED OR REPLACED, keeping them safe and secure with heat.
- → Only 556 HOUSEHOLDS needed SERVICE RESTORED through WCAC after disconnection due to the agency's strong shut-off prevention efforts.





#### **2023 PROGRAM OUTCOMES**

### Emergency Assistance

→ 2,017 HOUSEHOLDS received EMERGENCY FUEL deliveries and UTILITY PAYMENTS totaling more than \$1.5 MILLION to remediate no-heat emergencies through WCAC's Emergency Fuel Fund, which is generously supported by private donations from local utilities, and other community and banking partners. Donated funds included \$624,486 allocated to 1,410 households throughout WCAC's service area and another 607 households within the City of Worcester supported by \$1 million dollars in City ARPA funding.

#### **FUEL ASSISTANCE**

When the community was faced with the largest rate increases in recent memory for heating oil and an over 60% increase in the cost of electricity, generous donors supported WCAC, the City of Worcester supported WCAC and the state legislature provided supplemental heating. First-time

applications increased by 44% over the previous year, and overall applications increased 18%. WCAC's dynamic fuel assistance staff met the challenge of the winter heating season, which coincided with the agency's office relocation in the middle of winter, to provide critical service to thousands.

#### **ENERGY**

Throughout 2023, WCAC's Energy Efficiency program focused its support on clients' resilience to climate change, expanding and increasing the ability to improve homes and ultimately reduce our collective carbon footprint. Eligible participants are upgrading their heating systems to high efficiency Air Source Heat Pumps, providing clean, predictable and cost-effective heating and cooling.

#### **2023 PROGRAM OUTCOMES**

### Early Education and Care

- → Early Head Start Home Educators conducted 3,532 IN-PERSON VISITS for infants and toddlers, serving a total of 68 FAMILIES in 2022-23.
- → Head Start served 204 PRESCHOOLERS during the 2022-2023 school year, 104 enrolled in FULL-DAY and 100 in a PART-DAY program, allowing 131 PARENTS to hold EMPLOYMENT with another 35 either in JOB TRAINING or SCHOOL.
- → 84 PRESCHOOLERS were identified as DUAL LANGUAGE LEARNERS with one of six languages other than English in use as the primary language of their family at home.
- → 74 PRESCHOOL CHILDREN 'GRADUATED' from WCAC's Head Start program ready to enter Kindergarten.

- → The **HEAD START** program was supported by **5 INDIVIDUALS** providing **VOLUNTEER SERVICES** throughout the school year, including 1 of whom are current or former Head Start/Early Head Start parents.
- → Healthy Families of Southern Worcester County (HFSWC) provided a total of 1,481 VIRTUAL HOME VISITS to families promoting positive parenting choices and the prevention of child abuse and neglect to 40 FIRST-TIME PARENTS.





#### **EARLY EDUCATION AND CARE**

WCAC's Head Start program moved to a new innovative communication tool, Learning Genie, and staff became trained as Mobility Mentors to provide improved connection and support for families. In a continued effort to maximize positive impact on local families, WCAC expanded our facility footprint, opening three new classrooms - one in East Brookfield, two in Leicester.

- → 762 YOUTH received EMPLOYMENT through WCAC's Job & Education Center employment programs including 582 through the YOUTHWORKS Summer Jobs Program and 180 though the YouthWorks Year Round Program.
- → 692 received robust SKILLS and WORK-READINESS training.
- → During Summer 2023, 47% of the youth were in their FIRST JOB, EARNING \$2,400 over the six week work experience.
- → 44 INDIVIDUALS participated in HiSET preparation classes; 11 in POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION preparation, with 35 individuals having earned their HiSET or another nationally recognized CREDENTIAL, CERTIFICATE or DEGREE relating to the achievement of educational or vocational skills.
- → 110 YOUTH received case management through the SAFE & SUCCESSFUL YOUTH INITIATIVE.



#### **JOB & EDUCATION CENTER**

During 2023, WCAC's Job & Education Center (JEC) served its largest number of Youth Works participants in recent history! JEC launched a new online learning tool - Talent LMS - in January 2023, offering young people a robust, dynamic curriculum of work readiness training, easily accessible and self-paced to maximize participation and completion.

**Evan Smith** first came to WCAC to enroll in HiSET classes. He has since been a YouthWorks participant, completed and achieved his HiSET and in 2023 began working for WCAC at the Webster Head Start Center.

In 2023, **Kimora Scott**, a former JEC YouthWorks participant (having worked at both the Regional Environmental Council and Central Mass Regional Planning Commission) was awarded the Rising Workforce Leader Award at the Workforce Solutions Group 14th Annual MA Jobs and Workforce Summit.



# Resiliency Center/ Financial Empowerment

- → 27 VOLUNTEERS prepared federal and state INCOME TAX RETURNS at NO COST for 901 LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS through WCAC's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program generating \$1,403,000 in RETURNS to the community. The average return was \$1,864.
- → 447 INDIVIDUALS experiencing economic hardship received community resource navigation, consultations or COACHING from WCAC's FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT Coaches.
- → 26 INDIVIDUALS enrolled in a new GUARANTEED BASIC INCOME pilot.
- → 30 CLIENTS utilized a ZERO-INTEREST LOAN of \$600 via Axuda.



#### **RESILIENCY CENTER**

The Resiliency Center grew rapidly in 2023 both in terms of welcoming new staff members and expanding programming offered to the community. From an idea in 2019, the Resiliency Center has grown to a staff of nine who connect with clients daily to complete SNAP and RAFT applications, provide financial empowerment coaching, and provide referrals to community resources.

As an example of the Resiliency Center's impact, one client worked with a WCAC Financial Empowerment coach to obtain flex funding to apply for her national certification in phlebotomy. Since then, she has obtained full-time employment, opened a savings

account, has an appointment to open a credit builder loan and received a matched savings incentive. She obtained rental assistance to catc up on past due rent after a period of unemployment and was also connected with wellness support to cope with past trauma. Due to her new phlebotomy certification, she qualified for a pay increase of \$4.50 more per hour, bringing her salary up to a wage that will support her and her daughter going forward. As a participant in the agency's Guaranteed Basic Income pilot program, she will receive additional support and coaching for the next year as she works towards her household's goals.


