

MOBILITY MENTORING

WHAT IS IT?

Mobility Mentoring is a client-centered, coaching model designed to empower individuals on their journey toward economic independence.

By focusing on goals and strengths in areas such as employment, education/training, financial management, housing, and well-being, Mobility Mentoring equips participants with the tools, skills, and support they need to succeed.

To me, Mobility Mentoring is all about partnership. As a coach, I'm not here to decide for someone—I'm here to support them. This model acknowledges that we're all human, each carrying our own challenges and complexities. It creates space for clients to take the lead, and for us to walk alongside them without judgment.

One of the most rewarding moments in this work is when I see a client exhale. Often, we haven't fixed the problem yet, but acknowledged it together, normalized setbacks and reduced their mental load. That makes all the difference in how they prepare to move forward.

Mobility Mentoring isn't just transformative for clients—it's transformative for us as staff, too. It challenges us to grow and reflect, to center our work around what success looks like to the client, not just to the agency. It allows us to measure progress in a way that's holistic and human, encompassing every area of life. And that's what makes WCAC's impact truly meaningful.


